They need to be assured that they will not be left behind in times of environmental upheaval.

Human Development Initiative and its Baku Guiding Principles, launched by the COP29 Presidency is a step in the right direction.

For the first time, holistic human development climate action has been brought to the COP agenda, with a special focus on children and youth.
